There are 100 questions on the Citizenship Test. These questions are about important ideas and facts in American history and government.

This is an oral test. Study all of the questions. You don't know which questions you will have to answer. An officer of the United States Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS) will ask you 10 of these questions. You must answer at least 6 questions correctly to pass the test.

There are three kinds of questions: American Government, American History, and American Symbols and Holidays.

Some of the questions are about the president of the United States, the governor of your state and the U.S. senators from your state. The answers to these questions change because of elections or appointments.

You can find the answers that may have changed at USCIS.gov/citizenship/testupdates. You must answer with the name of the official in the office the time you are taking the test.

Some questions have several possible answers. There may be more answers than the ones on these pages. It's a good idea to answer the questions using one of the answers given here.

Are you 65 years old or older? Have you been living in the United States as a lawful permanent resident of the United States for 20 or more years?

If you answered yes to both of these questions, you only need to study the questions that are marked with an asterisk (*).

These are the only questions an officer will ask you. The USCIS officer will ask you 10 of the questions marked with an asterisk.

You must answer at least 6 out of 10 questions (or 60%) correctly to pass the 2008 version of the civics test.

You may also take the civics test in your native language.
